Williamsburg, Dec. 26. 1810.

It can not I presume have escaped your recollection that when the Rupture between Judge Roane & myself took place, I took the liberty of communicating the particulars to you, and of asking, and availing myself of your friendly advice.

I was yesterday informed that a Committee of the house of Delegates have very lately presented a report containing a censure against the Judges of the Court of appeals, generally, and referring to that Rupture as one of the causes of the delays in that Court.

May I presume to ask the favor of you to present to the house of Delegates the enclosed petition, occasioned by that report, and to request your attention to the subject matter thereof. My friend Mr. Cabell will be possessed of the Documents formerly communicated to you, with some others that occurred during your absence from Richmond; these I presume will be sufficient to give you such a view of the subject, as to manifest the propriety of the step which I request you to take in my behalf.
